 - Deployment of solutions/strategic investments
 - Healthier workforce
- Resolve impasse with DEEP re Hartford Landfill
- Increase water main replacement from 1-2 miles per year to 8-10 miles per year (capital spend will go from \$6 M to 26M a year)
- Phase 2 of the Raftelis Study
- Funding for the litigation settlements
- Riverfront Transition Plan
- Master Plan for Water Infrastructure (\$750M)

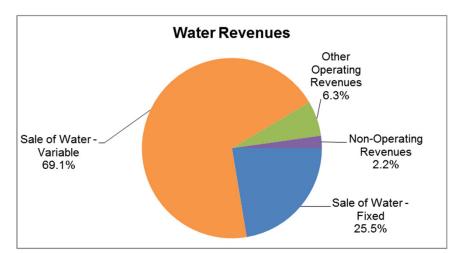

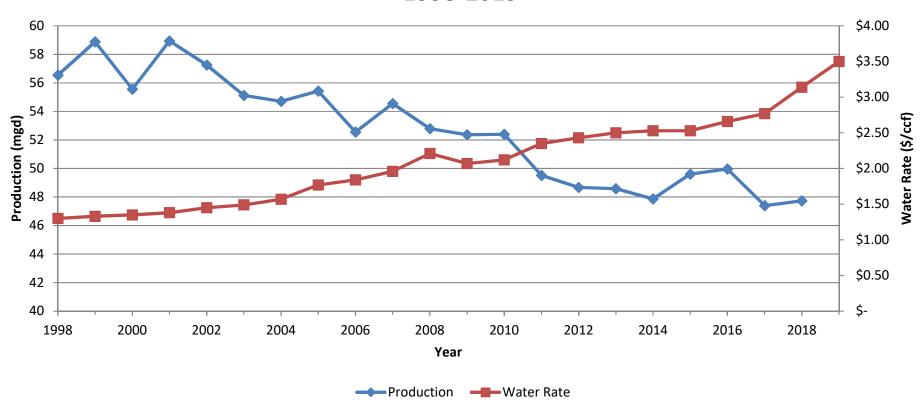

\$0.51 cents increase breakdown

- \$0.25 cents of the water rate increase is due to the reduction in consumption estimate from 18,400,000 to 17,737,600 ccf's, accounting for 7% (or half) of water rate increase.
- \$0.08 cents is due to the increase in debt service of which \$0.045 cents is attributable to the
 accelerated water main replacement program, which will increase the amount of water mains
 replaced to 10 miles in 2020.
- \$0.05 cents increase is attributable to employee benefits specifically medical, pension and opeb.
- \$0.13 cent increase is the result of proposed increases in operating expenses.
- Every \$1 million in revenue equates to \$.05 decrease in water rate

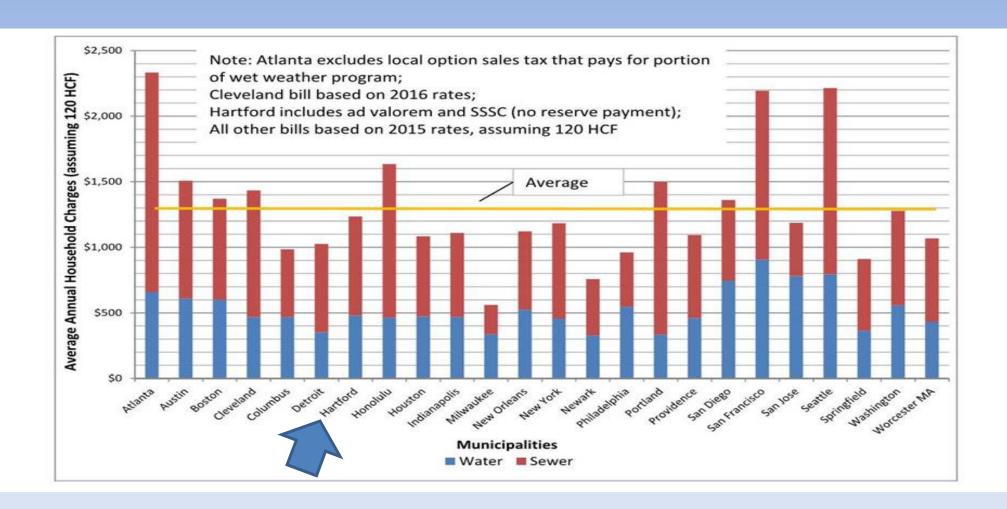

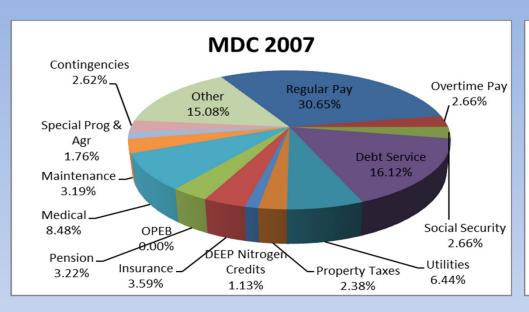

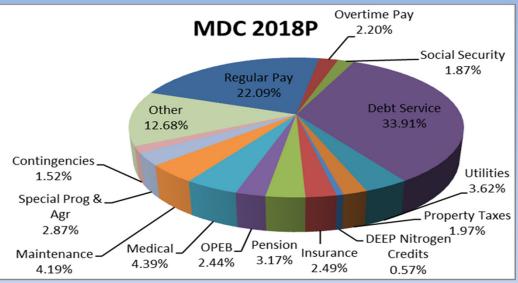

- The MDC has operated within a challenging economy while facing operating and capital expense increases. With these increases, the MDC has faced challenges in their efforts to keep rates down. As you can see in the chart 37% of our costs are payroll related.
- Given fixed expenses almost 80% of our budget is payroll and debt service.
- In 2007 MDC Spent \$5 Million on CIP water & sewer
- In 2018 MDC Spent \$75 Million on CIP water & sewer and \$120 million on the Clean Water Project

- Implemented cost containment initiatives, and strategically assessed our organizational structure and reorganized in a continuous effort to do more with less.
- Reorganization of departments helps us become more efficient and allows us to maximize the utilization of staff in order to accomplish the work.
- Negotiated more than 60 separate and distinct labor potions, converting them into 12 multitasking conversions
- Reduced our headcount over the last 10 years by approximately 200 people.
- (In 2011 as part of CRRA contract ending there were 45 layoffs and MDC absorbed another 35)

Union Contract Changes

New Employees

- Pension contribution increased to 7.5% of regular compensation
- No spousal or dependent medical/dental coverage upon retirement
- Retiree will pay the cost of coverage for life insurance upon retirement
- New employees enrolled in Health Savings Account(HSA)
- Must work at least 10 years to qualify for retiree medical
- Eliminated Medicare Part B reimbursement
- Spouses and dependents pay 100% of the premium. Assumes that 25% of retirees will elect spouse/dependent coverage

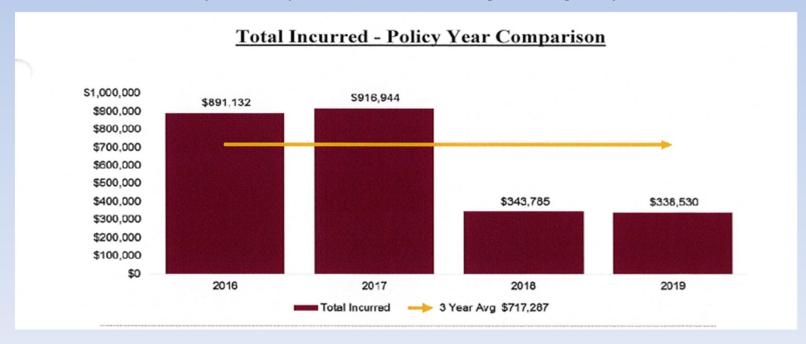
All Employees

- Moratorium on pension negotiations extended to December 31, 2025
- Existing employees can opt to change to the High Deductible Medical Plan
- Health Insurance premium cost share shall be advanced over the term of the contract to 18%
- All future retirements the District will buy out the base Life Insurance by paying the retiree a lump sum
- Classification request moratorium extended to December 31, 2022
- All employees will pay 1% of regular wages into the OPEB Fund

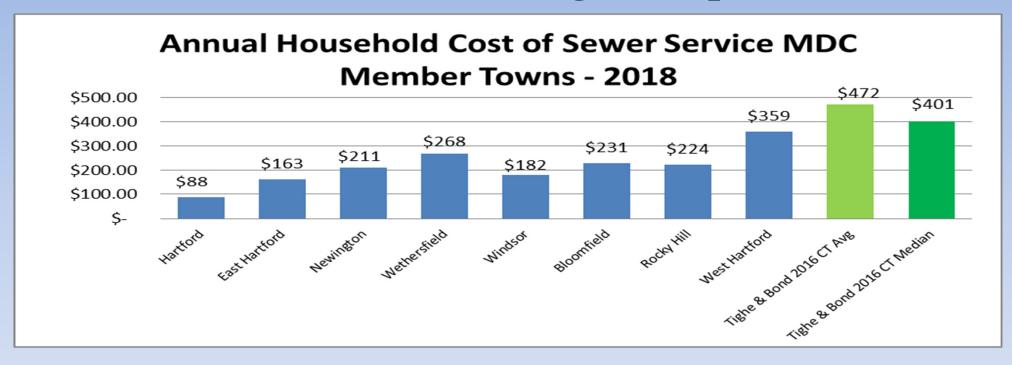
Savings of \$40 million in OPEB liability

Workers Compensation

- In 2018, Contracted with Workers Comp Trust to administer WC and FMLA programs
- The purpose of having a Workers Comp Administrator is to reduce the workers compensation costs by using cost containment measures to keep expenses to a minimum while providing quality medical care to the injured worker.
- The medical care plan has brought more control by limiting the network of medical providers and control
 over costs and unnecessary medical procedures. These changes have greatly reduced overall claim costs.



Ad Valorem Rate/Charge Comparison



 Average annual sewer charges range from \$88-\$359, lower than the CT average of \$472 and CT Median of \$401 (Tighe & Bond 2016)*

Public Act 13-78

- Allows private water companies expanded authority to charge fees to recover revenue lost due to conservation
- Exempts municipal water companies from submitting an annual report to PURA

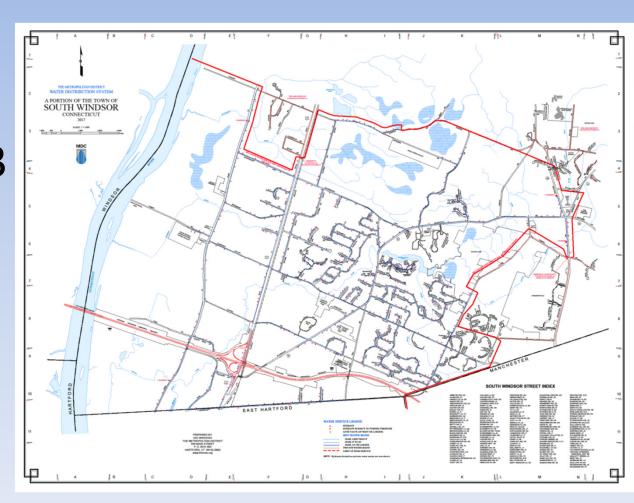
