5. Public Input

Mr. Andy Paterna, 301 Strawberry Lane stated that in the last three to four years, South Windsor has lost 33 acres of farmland on Graham Road to development, four acres on Pleasant Valley Road, and 40 acres on Barber Hill Road and would hate to see the Town contribute to loss of farmland on a proposal tonight for the 11 acres on Nevers Road. Mr. Paterna urged the Council to speak to SWALPAC regarding this proposal.

Mr. Steve Wagner, 181 Tumblebrook Drive stated that he feels anything the Town can do to help homeowners with crumbling foundations is very important and should support Item 14. K.

Mrs. Betty Warren, 494 Abbe Road came forward to speak in opposition of anything being done with the 11 acres on Nevers Road. This property is currently leased by a farmer through 2018 and she is dismayed about reducing any farmland in South Windsor. Farming is part of South Windsor's heritage.

At 8:00 p.m. Mayor Delnicki recessed the Regular Meeting in order to hold a Public Hearing. The Regular Meeting reconvened at 8:06 p.m.

6. Environmental Health & Safety Message

Councilor Anwar stated that November is Lung Cancer Awareness Month which is the number one cause in death for men and women. If an individual is at a high risk of having lung cancer, there are screening tools that are available now. It is also Diabetes Awareness Month. Better control of diabetes leads to improved quality of life.

Deputy Mayor Mirek informed the public and Council that November is also Hospice Positive Care Month as well as Thank a Caregiver Month.

Mr. Walter Summers, Fire Marshal came forward to announce the results of the employee's annual United Way Campaign. There were 50 employees who participated this year raising a total of \$4,806.00. Mr. Summers requested that people not use the deep fryers on their decks or on a flammable surface.

L. Resolution Directing Town Manager, Matthew B. Galligan to Send a Letter Saying "No" to a Casino in South Windsor

WHEREAS, there has recently been an interest shown in bringing a casino to the I-291 Corridor in South Windsor; and

WHEREAS, South Windsor residents have serious concerns about the impact the casino would have to the charter and the quality of life of residents in South Windsor

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the South Windsor Town Council hereby directs Town Manager, Matthew B. Galligan to send a letter to the relevant individuals and/or entities involved in the decision and interest in the casino coming to South Windsor to inform them that the South Windsor Town Council does not want a casino in the Town of South Windsor.

Was made by Councilor Anwar Seconded by Mayor Delnicki

Councilor Anwar stated that he is happy that people came out to discuss their concerns regarding a casino in South Windsor. A casino would bring in jobs and tax revenue but will also change the character of South Windsor. Councilor Anwar said it is important for the residents to understand where the Council stands on this issue and he hopes that the rest of the Council will support the resolution he has brought forward.

Mr. Galligan proposed that the Council table this item in order to hold an informational session regarding this project. The Council has a fiduciary obligation to get all information available before making a decision regarding this project. Tabling will enable the Council and the public to learn more about this project before prejudging it. There are five communities that are being looked at for this project and a location still needs to be selected. There may be a lot more public that may come out to speak on this project. The Town did not submit an RFP, that was done by DCK. The Economic Development Commission feels the Town should not prejudge an application

before knowing everything about the project. The entire Council learned and discussed this project in Executive Session.

Councilor Havens explained that this is not an easy decision, but he has not heard anyone say they want a casino in South Windsor.

Councilor Snyder stated that she values the opinion of those who came out tonight but as elected officials we should not be reactive without receiving all the information and reviewing that information. There are approximately 26,000 people that live in Town and the percentage we heard from tonight is small compared to the amount of people in Town. The Council should hear from more public. This is a DCK project, not a Town project and no one has seen any information yet.

Mr. Galligan explained that when Evergreen Walk was developed, that project was not brought to the Council because it is a land use project. The developer needs to follow a process through the different Commissions/Boards as well as the Town regulations.

Councilor Snyder also informed the public that South Windsor has not been selected as the Town to construct a casino. There are five communities that are being looked at for this project and a location still needs to be selected.

Councilor Snyder made a motion to table Item. 14. L. Councilor Carroll seconded the motion; and it passed on a roll call vote of 6 to 2 with Councilor Anwar and Councilor Havens voting in opposition of tabling.

13. <u>Unfinished Business</u>

A. Resolution Appointing Joshua Johnson (D) to the Mass Transit and Highway Advisory Board

BE IT RESOLVED that the South Windsor Town Council hereby appoints Joshua Johnson (D) to the Mass Transit and Highway Advisory Board for a term ending November 30, 2019 to fill the expired term of Anthony Duarte.

Was made by Councilor Havens Seconded by Councilor Snyder The motion was approved, unanimously

> B. Discussion Item: Senior Citizens Tax Exemptions (postpones from the September 19, 2016 Town Council Meeting) (requested by Mayor Delnicki)

Mayor Delnicki requested that Ms. Huda who is the Town Assessor come before the Town Council and review the changes to the Veterans' Exemption Ordinance.

Veterans' Exemption

Councilor Carroll and Councilor Pendleton recused themselves from discussions regarding the Veterans' Exemption.

Mrs. Mary Huda, Town Assessor came before the Town Council and reviewed the changes to the Ordinance for the Veterans' Exemption. She clarified that the changes are specifically for the income qualified portion of the benefit. The specific changes are to update the section pertaining to 90-4 and to update to the amount that the state has now allows which is going from a \$10,000 maximum to a \$20,000 maximum exempt amount.

Answering questions from the Council, Mrs. Huda explained that it is all income qualified.

13. B. (Continued)

Senior Citizens Tax Exemption

Mayor Delnicki stated that the local factor shall be set annually by the Town Council. Mayor Delnicki questioned what changes could be made to the Senior Exemption that would be in line with the OPM numbers and what would the actual effect be for a senior citizen?

Mrs. Huda explained that the Council should have received the updated state qualifying limits. The state did not make any cost of living changes for 2016. The current local factor is at 1.3. The Council is not mandated or restricted in that factor. You could keep it at the same amount or go to a 1.4 or 1.5. The Council would be increasing about \$17,000 per .1 of the factor. This is a budgetary decision going forward. The Council has the ability to raise that factor. There are other Towns that have the local factor and Ms. Huda said she could get that information for the Council.

Mayor Delnicki requested that Mrs. Huda reviewed what other Towns are doing and make a recommendation to the Council. Mrs. Huda explained that she would do that and also informed the Council that there is a Part B to this also depending on how much the Council would like to get into the local option.

Answering further questions, Mrs. Huda explained that Part B is if the Town only exceeds the state income qualifying limits by \$4,000 or less, the Town grants a flat rate of \$195.00. There are twenty-three people who qualify for that benefit. Again, that \$4,000 is set by local ordinance. The \$195.00 is also set by local ordinance. These factors are all within the Town Councils purview to update or keep the same.

Councilor Carroll stated that the state is staying status quo but the cost of living is going up. Councilor Carroll felt that the Town should be reviewing this issue. Mrs. Huda stated that the state has been reimbursing this program and it has been fully funded up to this point, but may be subject to change.

Answering questions from Councilor Pendleton, Mrs. Huda explained that this program benefits individuals over 65. This is a bi-annual filing process and the Assessor's Office works with Human Services to identify individuals who qualify for this program.

Councilor Havens stated that if the law provides that South Windsor has the ability to do this, then it should be done.

Councilor Anwar said there will be an impact on the Town's taxes because of the crumbling foundations. Our budget is decreasing and Councilor Anwar questioned how this would affect the taxpayers? Mrs. Huda explained that regarding the 2016 grand list, the Town had 23 homeowners that came to the office for reassessment, of those, 21 submitted engineering report which is required. An inspection was done on the 21 homes and the Town has prepared a reduced assessment on those 21 homes using the CRCOG recommended depreciation guidelines. It is estimated to be \$2,214,005 of assessed dollars which is a tax loss of \$82,671 at our current mill rate. A draft letter is being done which will inform those residents.

Mr. Galligan added that the Town does have other assessments coming in from Eversource for the new Barbour Hill Substation so that will be an offset. The first time we did the senior exemption, the impact was \$137,000.

Councilor Anwar requested the total dollar amount that will impact the taxpayers if the changes for the seniors and veterans move forward. Mrs. Huda stated that she has not projected a factor at this time but the Town's total benefit currently to the 300 homeowners for the senior's exemption is \$396,000. The state portion comes back to the Town which totals \$174,000. For the 105 homeowners that are in the local option for veterans, the total tax benefit is \$17,000.

Councilor Anwar stated so for those two programs the total impact is roughly \$321,000. Councilor Anwar said he is supportive of helping the seniors in Town and is worried about the impact of the crumbling foundations to the Town. The Town should find a way to help Individuals who are classified as the working poor also.

14. New Business (Continued)

D. Resolution Designating the South Windsor Board of Education as the Building Committee for the Ellsworth Roof Replacement

WHEREAS, the South Windsor Town Council approved the Ellsworth School Roof Replacement Project as part of the Capital Projects Budget at its May 16, 2016 meeting

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the South Windsor Town Council hereby designates the South Windsor Board of Education as the Building Committee for State Project Number TMP-132-PFQZ, Ellsworth Roof Replacement Project; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the South Windsor Town Council authorizes the Board of Education to proceed with preparation of the necessary schematic drawings and outline specifications for the project; and authorizes South Windsor's Superintendent of Schools to file application for a School Construction Project Grant.

Was made by Councilor Snyder Seconded by Councilor Carroll

Councilor Snyder stated that this was discussed at Capital Projects last year and she trusts that the Board of Education will do a wonderful job overseeing this project.

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ITEM:

14. D. (Continued)

Answering questions from Councilor Anwar, Mr. Galligan explained that the money will come from the Capital Projects plus any reimbursements they may receive.

Mr. Patrick Hankard, Director of Facilities for the South Windsor schools came before the Council and explained that the project is estimated to be \$490,000. That estimate assumes all new slate materials. The Town will be responsible for \$260,000 and the State will pay \$229,877.

The Mayor called for a vote on the motion; it was approved, unanimously.

E. Resolution Pursuant to Section 8-24 of the Connecticut General Statutes Referring Proposed Improvements of Eleven Acres of Park Land on Nevers Road to the South Windsor Planning & Zoning Commission

WHEREAS, any plan to improve park lands owned by the Town must first be submitted to the South Windsor Planning & Zoning Commission for a report pursuant to Section 8-24 of the Connecticut General Statutes

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the South Windsor Town Council hereby refers the proposed improvements of eleven acres of park land on Nevers Road (across from Ayers Road) to the South Windsor Planning & Zoning Commission pursuant to Section 8-24 of the Connecticut General Statutes.

Was made by Councilor Pendleton Seconded by Councilor Carroll

Mr. Galligan explained that there were businessmen who want to do a project. The fields will be left open for people to go and use as a park. There will be a small driveway constructed. The property could be used for the Farmers Market. The Town will not be contributing any funds towards this project. There is a proposal to do this project through the Neighborhood Assistance Act. This project would have to go through Town staff to make sure everything is being done correctly. Mr. Galligan informed the Council that he

had met with the farmer who is farming the property currently and the farmer did say this would not be detrimental to him.

Answering questions from the Council, Mr. Galligan explained that there would be a driveway constructed as well as an area for parking. Grading will have to be completed in order to hold the Farmers Market at this location.

Councilor Pendleton stated that she understands there are two different legal opinions regarding this property as well as the history of this property. Mr. Galligan explained that Attorney Mike Markowicz had done a legal opinion. In that opinion it is explained that there were no restrictions put on the land records for the use of that property. Mr. Galligan said he does not know of a second legal opinion but would try to find that.

Councilor Pendleton made a motion to table Item 14. E. in order to get all of the historical documentation and would also like a new legal opinion from the Town Attorney because currently the Town has two conflicting opinions regarding the allowed uses for this property. Councilor Havens seconded the motion; and it failed on a roll call vote of 3 to 5 with Councilor Anwar, Councilor Havens and Councilor Pendleton voting in favor of the motion; and Mayor Delnicki, Deputy Mayor Mirek, Councilor Carroll, Councilor Riley and Councilor Snyder voting in opposition of the motion.

Councilor Anwar explained that there has been discussion regarding sports fields in this location in the past and the Council has said no because the neighbors have been opposed to fields in this location. Councilor Anwar said he would not be comfortable having this proposal go any further without a public discussion and having the neighbors involved.

Mr. Galligan informed the Council that the gentlemen who are involved with this proposal did have a discussion with the Mr. Morrison. Mr. Galligan then stated that the other neighbors will be contacted. The Park & Recreation Commission approved this proposal, but there are other Boards/Commissions to review this. If the Council approves this to go to the Planning & Zoning Commission for an 8-24 referral, then it will go there and then back to the Council.

14. E. (Continued)

Answering questions from the Council, Mr. Galligan explained that when this proposal comes back to the Town Council there will be a plan and specifications. It will not cost the taxpayers any money. The businessmen's names will not be shared until they file an application.

Councilor Havens said when different proposals were discussed to be at this property, the neighbors were very much against the proposals because they wanted their peace and quiet. There is not a shortage of recreational fields in this Town.

Mr. Galligan said he would have to go through this process and then would notify the neighbors. There is a Councilor requesting the prior legal opinions from the Town Attorney and also requesting the current Town Attorney give a legal opinion.

Deputy Mayor Mirek stated that this is not the same project that was proposed previously.

Councilor Carroll commented that this property was purchased by the Town prior to the development being constructed. This is Town owned property and can be used however the Town pleases.

Councilor Pendleton stated that the land was purchased for a specific use and that is why she would like to get the historical information so everyone can be informed before a decision is made. Councilor Pendleton requested the Town Manager to read the letter from the Park & Recreation Commission. Mr. Galligan read the letter into the record, as shown in attached **Exhibit A**.

Councilor Pendleton requested that a plan be sent to the Council regarding this proposal.

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ITEM:

14. E. (Continued)

Councilor Anwar questioned if any of the Council members know who these businessmen are. Mr. Galligan explained that when an application is submitted, then all of the Council members will have that information. Councilor Anwar suggested that these businessmen be referred to as volunteers.

Mayor Delnicki called for a vote on the original motion; it passed on a roll call vote of 5 to 3 with Mayor Delnicki, Deputy Mayor Mirek, Councilor Carroll, Councilor Riley and Councilor Snyder voting in favor of the original motion; and Councilor Anwar, Councilor Havens and Councilor Pendleton voting in opposition of the original motion.

F. Resolution Approving a Transfer of \$20,000 from the Contingency Account to the Sidewalk Account

BE IT RESOLVED that the South Windsor Town Council hereby approves a transfer of \$20,000 from the Contingency Account to the Sidewalk Account to cover costs associated with improvements to public sidewalks.

Was made by Councilor Riley Seconded by Councilor Carroll

Mr. Galligan explained that after all of our road improvements were completed, Mr. Gantick came to him and said that the Town needs to do some sidewalk repairs. There is no money in the budget and it has been estimated that \$15,000 to \$17,000 of immediate repairs should be completed. When the next budget is discussed, more funds should be put towards the sidewalks.

Councilor Snyder told the Council that the request for sidewalk funding has been in the Capital Projects budget for approximately 3 years and funding needs to begin for the repair of sidewalks.

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ITEM:

14. F. (Continued)

Councilor Pendleton questioned how much money is in the sidewalk accounts at this time? Mr. Galligan answered that there is none. Councilor Pendleton stated she is deeply concerned that this has not been taken care of because it is a safety concern. During the budget, this needs to be a priority.

Deputy Mayor Mirek added that the Capital Projects reviewed the needs and this \$20,000 will only be a start for repairs of sidewalks. The worst situations should be taken care of with the \$20,000.

Councilor Havens felt that this is a good idea to start repairing the sidewalks.

Councilor Anwar said this is something that has been asked for in the past, but the Town did not have the resources. Councilor Anwar requested the priority locations? Mr. Galligan said he would have Mike Gantick send the list to the Council after it has gone out to bid. Councilor Anwar stated that the list is based on the severity of the problem.

Mayor Delnicki called for a vote on the motion; it was approved, unanimously.

G. Resolution Approving a Transfer of \$4,000 from the Contingency Account to the Cemetery Account

BE IT RESOLVED that the South Windsor Town Council hereby approves a transfer of \$4,000 from the Contingency Account to the Cemetery Account to cover costs associated with the maintenance of Center Cemetery on Main Street.

Was made by Councilor Anwar Seconded by Mayor Delnicki

Mr. Galligan explained to the Council that when the budget was first done there was a request of \$12,000. At that time the Town could only give \$8,000 towards the maintenance of Center Cemetery. It is an obligation for the Town

to maintain cemeteries and Mr. Galligan recommended that the Town give Center Cemetery the remainder of the funds that were requested.

Mayor Delnicki called for a vote on the motion; it was approved, unanimously.

> Resolution Amending and Restating a Prior Resolution Concerning Building Permit Fee Waivers for Building Permits to Repair or Replace **Defective Foundations**

WHEREAS, the Town building official is appointed pursuant to C.G.S. Sec. 29-260, and such official is authorized to enforce the state building code pursuant to Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies Sec. 29-252-1d; and

WHEREAS, the state building code specifically authorizes municipalities to establish a schedule of building fees (Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies Sec. 29-252-1d); and

WHEREAS, on June 6, 2016, the Council adopted a resolution regarding the waiver of permit fees for defective foundations which did not specifically address the issue of refunds for prior repairs of defective foundations; and

WHEREAS, the Council wishes to amend and restate the prior resolution to specifically address this issue

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Town's schedule of building permit fees shall include a waiver for permits submitted for the repair or replacement of defective concrete foundations, including basement walls, footings, and floors, and further, that in order to obtain such waiver, the applicant shall submit to the building official an application for a waiver either with the permit application, or at anytime within 5 years of the permit being issued, along with evidence of the defective concrete, to the satisfaction of the building official or the official's designee. Further in the event of a waiver being approved after a permit has issued, the building official or the designee may approve, in the official's sole discretion, a refund of any or all fees paid and related to the repair or replacement of defective concrete.

Mayor Delnicki explained that this motion came from conversations that the Council had previously to allow individuals who had crumbling foundations prior to the first resolution being approved, to be able to have permit fees waived. South Windsor is setting a standard that other communities can follow.

Councilor Anwar said he is hopeful that this will be approved, how soon can people apply for this? Mr. Galligan explained that they could apply for reimbursement by tomorrow as long as this is approved tonight.

Councilor Anwar felt it is important for the Town to support individuals with crumbling foundations any way possible.

Deputy Mayor Mirek agreed that anything the Town can do to support our residents is fantastic and requested that this resolution be added to the Town's website.

Mayor Delnicki called for a vote on the motion; it was approved, unanimously.

Mr. Galligan reported that the Town received an award for best budget presentation for the third year in a row. The Town will be applying for an award for its financials also. Next week, Mr. Galligan informed the Council that he would be in Georgia giving a presentation on Connecticut Prime.

Answering questions from the Council, Mr. Galligan explained that CREC will be paying for him to go to the conference. He also told the Council that the Town will be informed when the next round is to apply for a STEAP grant.

Councilor Riley questioned how the Town is doing collecting sewer fees? Mr. Galligan explained that about one year ago the Town put out a Request for Proposal for the collection of delinquent sewer fees. When a company was almost chosen, it was found that the Constables were doing those collections. WPCA decided to see how the Constables did with collections. There is a process that needs to be followed which has turned out to be overwhelming. Mr. Galligan recommends that the Town use an outside company. There is between \$600,000 to \$700,000 that is past due but some of that is interest. There will be a meeting set with WPCA to discuss this further.

Councilor Riley requested that the collection of delinquent sewer fees be added to the next Town Council agenda.

Answering questions from Councilor Pendleton, Mr. Galligan stated that there is a process when residents are having trouble paying their sewer fees, they can go to Human Services.

Mayor Delnicki felt that a correction action should be drafted with compassion for individuals who have certain circumstances.

Mr. Galligan explained that WPCA would be paying for the outside firm, but usually it is on the percentage collected.

Councilor Anwar felt that these collection firms usually do not have compassion. The Constables are community members who are doing a good job and do not

cost the Town money. Mr. Galligan explained that the Constables do get paid, but he would have to come back to the Council with the amount.

Councilor Riley stated that he agrees with Councilor Anwar that the Town has some good Constables that represent the Town well, but he is not sure they are equipped with the appropriate tools to effectively get the job done. Councilor Riley feels that the Manager should meet with the WPCA to discuss this.

17. Public Input

Mrs. Betty Warren, 494 Abbe Road and Vice Chairperson of SWALPAC came before the Council and questioned why SWALPAC was not consulted about the proposal on the 11 acres on Nevers Road. This property is active agriculture and is being leased.

Mr. Andy Paterna, 301 Strawberry Lane agreed with Mrs. Warren that SWALPAC should have been notified about the proposal on the 11 acres on Nevers Road. The Town Council always talks about transparency or open government, and so Mr. Paterna felt that the Town should start thinking about televising the Planning & Zoning Commission meetings so that if people can not make it to the meeting in person, they have the option to watch on television. Mr. Paterna stated he also feels that a public meeting should be held prior to the Planning & Zoning Commission discussing it so that the public is more informed about this proposal. The Planning & Zoning Commission's jurisdiction will not include making a decision if this proposal should go forward, they will be looking at how many parking spaces are allowed and those types of requirements.

Mrs. Kathy Hale, 54 Orchard Hill Drive came forward and voiced her concern about the project on Nevers Road and questioned how many parking spaces are being proposed? Mr. Galligan answered 60.

Mrs. Hale stated that there will be maintenance expenses that the Town will have to cover for this property. This proposal clearly impacts agriculture and SWALPAC should have been informed. Public outreach with this property is very important. It is distressing to hear that one of the local land owners who used to be an employee of the Town was the only one consulted.

As stipulated in the Book of Ordinances Article II, Section 74-32(b) this letter serves as the Park and Recreation Commission's (PARC) official response to the Town Council's referral of the 11 Acre Multi-Use Greenspace Plan at Never Park.

The PARC endorses the proposed multi-use greenspace plan for the property as it will enhance recreational opportunities for our residents and provide needed and purposeful use of this previously unused portion of Nevers Park, other than for agricultural purposes. We agree with the town staff recommendations to utilize this location to support the growing need for large open space for activities such as pick up play, or even the Farmer's Market.

We additionally want to share the following suggestions for consideration and hopeful implementation in the development of the project to encourage maximum community use:

- 1. Other than the proposed 60 vehicle parking lot, the open grass areas should remain simply open grass areas to accommodate a variety of uses and not be designated as athletic fields. We are not recommending permanent installation of any specific sport game goals.
- 2. The size and location of the site is ideal for uses beyond those mentioned above and as such should not be restricted exclusively for those purposes. It should be available to accommodate future needs.
- 3. We also suggest that this site be connected to the existing stone dust trail system to the east and the community center to the south for pedestrian access.
