1. Call Meeting to Order

Deputy Mayor Paterna called the Regular Meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

After roll call was complete, the Town of South Windsor recognized Pioneer Aerospace Corporation who produced the parachute that helped the In-Sight land on Mars on November 26, 2018.

5. Communications and Reports from Town Manager

Mr. Galligan reported on the following:

- Attended the Planning & Zoning Commission Meeting on Tuesday, November 27, 2018. They approved all three 8-24 referrals that the Council has sent to them regarding the properties that the Town is interested in purchasing.
- The traffic study by the Police Department was completed on Laurel Street. The Engineering Department will review the study to see if any traffic calming measures can be used for this street. Laurel Street will continue to be monitored.
- Thanked the Public Works Department who have accomplished a lot of projects in Town.
- The Hartford Foundation has created a program for 29 Towns. There will be \$100,000 given to each Town with \$50,000 of it being in an endowment

where only interest can be used and the other \$50,000 will be a grant. A Committee has to be established in order to receive these funds. Mr. Galligan recommended that the South Windsor Community Foundation be the Committee to receive the grant because the Committee has to be a 501C3 which the Community Foundation is. The Council can decide what projects should be done and then send those projects to the Community Foundation.

- Sent the Council a confidential update from the Town Attorney regarding 460 Miller Road.

Councilor Snyder explained that the Community Foundation has discussed the grants from the Hartford Foundation. The Community Foundation is a 501C3 and the money that comes in stays in South Windsor. We have granted over \$125,000. The IRS accepted the Community Foundations by-laws and a Distribution Committee has been established. The Community Foundation could bring projects to the Council for their approval.

Answering questions from the Council, Mr. Galligan explained that numbers for the budget have been established and the details of the budget will be worked on by the department heads. The budget process will consist of having the normal process and having a statement showing fixed and variable costs. Some numbers may not be just fixed and variable, there are gray areas in the budget process. The budgets will be worked on and there will be a point where items to be purchased can be decided upon. The budget process will begin in January. There will be a presentation at the next Town Council meeting regarding a different way to do the trash pick-up which could save money in the budget. Mr. Galligan stated that he would be scheduling a Before and After School Care Committee.

Deputy Mayor Paterna informed the Council that he will be stepping down from the Before and After School Care Committee so that Karen Lydecker can be one of the representatives from the Council on that Committee. Mr. Galligan added that another resident will need to be appointed to the Committee.

Answering further questions, Mr. Galligan stated that he would be meeting with Kevin Witkos from Eversource regarding the gas connection on Main Street.

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6. Public Input (Items Not on the Agenda)

Mr. David McDonald, Laurel Street came before the Town Council and stated that if the engineering report could be done as fast as the traffic study, permanent speed humps could be installed on the street before the bad weather begins. If the engineering report cannot be done as quickly, the residents of the area are requesting that temporary speed humps be installed until the asphalt plants open again. Mr. Galligan stated that Mr. McDonald should call him tomorrow. Mr. McDonald informed the Council that two cars were drag racing down Laurel Street today.

Councilor Hockenberry reported that the Human Relations Commission held a successful Food Drive on Sunday, December 2nd. All donations went to the South Windsor Food Bank.

Councilor Hockenberry also reported that the Board of Education reviewed all of their policies which are in a binder and will be reviewed again in the future.

Councilor Snyder stated that there was a Library Board Meeting held on November 27th. The Library Board has decided to create a 3-year Strategic Plan. To create this document it will cost \$10,000 but \$5,000 of it will be covered through a grant.

Mrs. Etter then explained that the Human Relations Commission and the South Windsor Public Library will be working collaboratively on the South Windsor Photography Contest. The contest is opened to South Windsor residents and those who work in South Windsor. The chosen topic is "Faces of South Windsor". The deadline to submit the photos are January 31st. The winner will be announced on March 3, 2019 at 2:00 p.m. at the South Windsor Public Library.

F. Discussion item: South Windsor Public Library Community Calendar (Burbio) *(requested by Councilor Snyder)*

Mrs. Etter, Director of the South Windsor Public Library explained that Burbio is an electronic aggregator of calendars. This application was devised by a couple who were running their daughters soccer league in Westchester and were frustrated because scheduling was such an issue. A number of Town's and Libraries are using this program. A sponsor in Town will inform other non-profits in Town about this program and will ask those non-profits if their calendars can be used and put into one place. It allows people to review a variety of calendars on-line, in one place. The application is free and participation is free. More information is shown about this program on the attached, **Exhibit B**.

Answering questions from Council members, Mrs. Etter explained that an individual will have the ability to sync their calendar to this application but will not be able to add items to the calendar after it is added to Burbio. The Burbio program will be administered by Burbio and the Library will oversee the program. When looking at the each calendar item, it will direct you to the website where it originated.

Mr. Scott Roberts explained further to the Council that Burbio is a platform to put a lot of information in one area. Burbio is a linking mechanism to bring different items from different websites together.

Answering questions from Councilor Pendleton, Mr. Galligan explained that this resolution is different than the resolution previously approved because the name of the department has since changed. This resolution is also for the next round of grant monies coming in January which is a regional approach.

B. Resolution Authorizing Town Manager, Matthew B. Galligan to Sign and Execute Necessary Documents to Receive the Small Cities Community Development Block Grant for the Modernization of Wapping Mews

WHEREAS, the Town of South Windsor was awarded \$800,000 from the Connecticut Small Cities Community Development Block Grant Program, for the modernization of Wapping Mews; and

E. Discussion Item: Changing the Age for the Purchase of Cigarettes, Vapor, Tobacco, and Paraphernalia (*requested by Mayor Anwar*)

Deputy Mayor Paterna explained that he gave the Council a document which states the number of States around the country and the number of Towns in each State that have raised the age to purchase tobacco products. Massachusetts has 182 Towns that have an ordinance and in Connecticut, Hartford is the only one. The General Assembly is considering this issue now. Deputy Mayor Paterna stated he would be meeting with Jeff Currey to discuss this issue.

Councilor Maneeley stated that she does not feel the Town should be deciding on the age to allow individuals to purchase tobacco products, and should remain with the State of Connecticut. At 18 you are allowed to vote and go into the military. If individuals at this age want to smoke, they should be able to make that decision.

Councilor Hockenberry explained that she has done some research and feels this would be beneficial to members of our community.

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


RE: Avery Street Project 2016, Guard Rail Placement

To Whom It May Concern;

In July of 2016, the day after the construction of a guard rail began across the street from my residence at 595 Avery Street, a residential neighborhood, I contacted Jeff Doolittle the Town Engineer to ask about the necessity of it as it was an eye sore. I was told he would look into it, and assured that it wouldn't be there unless it absolutely had to be. Over the six month course of this project, many promises were made to us for the inconvenience, delays and excessive wear and tear on our cars and lives caused by the demolition of the old road including sewer, gas, and water lines. Removing this guard rail was the one accommodation we asked for. After hearing about the Avery Brook culvert/sewer redesign requested by our neighbors, I had believed we could work something out. Mr Doolittle followed up our conversations by coming to my house and identifying a dried up brook behind the side walk as a potential hazard should a car veer off the road, saying that it was a state mandated regulation, requiring them to install the guard rail. I went to the state and requested a copy of the regulation and they were unable to find anything that required the guard rail for that reason.

At the town council meeting on February 6, 2017, Mr. Galligan concluded that a guard rail would not be removed from the Avery Street Project, which was completed in the fall of 2016. Neither he, nor Jeff Doolittle, the Town Engineer, were able to find any state regulation that mandated it. In my original letter, I had asked that if the guard rail needed to be there, could it be moved to the other side of the sidewalk, so that it wasn't such an eyesore? My neighbors had talked about the accommodations the town had made for them throughout this project, it didn't seem like a lot to ask for. The town had eliminated a safety fence over the box culvert and placed decorative white rock boulders at the mouth of the drain inflow, where the Avery Brook enters the drain. I will gladly apologize to anyone able to produce this regulation, but I am unable to find it and I am still looking for a fair resolution to this problem. Thank you for your time and consideration.
