1. Call Meeting to Order

Mayor Paterna called the Regular Meeting to order at 7:00 p.m.

4. Mayor's Comments

Mayor Paterna reminded the Council and the public that the Council is holding meetings in accordance with the Governor's Executive Order 7B, which is a suspension of in-person open meeting requirements.

Mayor Paterna then stated that the Council is getting close to the end of the budget cycle and suggested that a Special Work Session be held next week before voting on the budget on May 18, 2020.

5. Adoption of Agenda

Councilor Evans made a motion to adopt the agenda as presented. Councilor Snyder seconded the motion, and it was approved unanimously.

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6. Communications and Reports from Town Manager

Mr. Maniscalco reviewed the COVID-19 Response, as shown in attached **Exhibit** A.

Mr. Maniscalco then reviewed updates to the budget. The Board of Education has proposed a reduction to their budget, reducing their increase to 0%, which brings the mill rate to 38.13 (a .37 mill reduction) or a .95% tax decrease. At this time, the Town will have approximately an \$800,000 surplus in the General Government budget. After meeting with Mayor Paterna, Councilor Delnicki, Deputy Mayor Pendleton, and Councilor Snyder, it has been proposed that a portion of the surplus be put towards a COVID-19 fund, a portion towards the General Fund, and \$400,000 to \$500,000 to reduce the amount into next year's Capital. Doing this would give the Town a mill rate of 37.99 (.51 mill reduction) or a 1.32% decrease in taxes. In the meetings, it was also discussed reducing leaf pick-up to one pass for the entire community, which would reduce the budget by \$266,000; and reducing the fee that is provided to the condominiums. There is a resolution on the agenda tonight regarding the municipal waste contract, which will reduce taxes further.

Councilor Snyder requested that a worksheet be sent out to Council members showing the budget reductions for the General Government and the Board of Education.

Mr. Maniscalco explained to the Council that there had been discussions about a potential second wave of COVID-19 in the fall. If this were to happen, it is felt that it would be better to have a fund set up to take care of any costs associated with COVID-19. The Town would request FEMA reimbursements for any costs associated with COVID-19, and after COVID-19 is done, that money would revert into Capital Non-Recurring or the General Fund.

10. Reports from Committees

Councilor Lydecker stated that she had attended the Board of Education meeting held on Tuesday, April 28, 2020. At that meeting, Dr. Carter informed the Board of Education that there had been almost 15,000 breakfasts and lunches given out. They are averaging about 350 breakfasts and lunches daily. May 1, 2020, is National Lunch Hero Day. Eli Terry and Philip R. Smith schools are still on schedule and on budget. High School Graduation ideas are being worked on. Also, there was a lot of discussion regarding the reduction in the Board of Education budget.

Councilor Hockenberry reported that the Human Relations Commission would be holding a meeting. At that meeting, discussions will be held about sending money to the Food Bank.

13. New Business

A. Discussion Item: Details of Hazard Pay for Town Employees (requested by Councilor Maneeley)

Mr. Maniscalco gave a presentation regarding Hazard Pay, as shown in attached **Exhibit M**.

Councilor Maneeley explained that she brought this item forward because she has received a lot of questions regarding hazard pay. Also, after reviewing the pay periods, Councilor Maneeley stated that she was concerned that all employees, who are getting this pay, receive fair and equitable pay. She felt that stopping the hazard pay on May 8, 2020, would do this but after listening and understanding that employee's schedules are

so diverse, stopping the hazard pay on May 8, 2020, is a moot point, and there would be no fair and equitable way to make sure each employee receives the same amount in hazard pay. Councilor Maneeley wanted to bring to the Council's attention that there are a lot of people who are being affected by COVID-19.

Mr. Maniscalco explained that the idea of splitting employees work weeks from each other is to have employees available in case an employee was to get sick. This would ensure that the Town maintains services to its residents. Mr. Maniscalco stated that although ambulance service is an essential function, the company that provides these services to the Town is privately owned, and the Town is unable to control how they get paid, and are unable to offer them a stipend.

Mayor Paterna stated that he appreciates and values that work that is being done by Town staff.

Councilor Lydecker stated that she is not in support of the resolution that is being proposed tonight and thanked the Town staff for their hard work during these uncertain times.

Mr. Maniscalco explained that in order for services to continue, it is very important that each office is staffed. Inspections throughout the Town are still being done.

Deputy Mayor Pendleton explained that Councilor Maneeley's intent with the resolution tonight was to change the date that the hazard pay would end in order to give employees fair and equitable pay, and was not to remove the hazard pay, but she has since found out that employees have various shifts and work weeks, the resolution does not accomplish what she was trying to do.

Councilor Delnicki thanked the Town Manager for taking her suggestion and constructing a vestibule, which will keep Town employees safe from the public. Mr. Maniscalco explained that the Police Department already has a window between the dispatch area and lobby, which can act as a vestibule, so there will not be one constructed at the Police Department. Councilor Delnicki explained that she had wanted one there so reports could be filed without Police Officers having to be face to face with the person filing a report.

Councilor Maneeley stated that she has the utmost respect and appreciation for Town staff and was looking for an equitable and fair way for employees, who are working, to get the same pay as each other. Councilor Maneeley stated she wanted to make everyone aware that there are many residents who have been furloughed, lost their jobs and their ability to provide for their families, and are facing an uncertain financial future. There are many friends, neighbors, and residents who work at grocery stores, pharmacies, hardware stores, retirement homes, and school cafeteria staff who do these services without hazard pay. Councilor Maneeley explained that the resolution that is on the agenda was written with the best intentions but stated she would be withdrawing the resolution tonight.

Councilor Hockenberry stated that she appreciated the resolution that Councilor Maneeley had brought forward because there have been a lot of questions asked regarding hazard pay. Councilor Hockenberry stated that she hopes the Town Manager's presentation tonight has answered all of the questions that have been asked. Councilor Hockenberry questioned if there are enough PPE for Town employees? Mr. Maniscalco explained that presently the Town is good with PPE, but it is a constant battle to maintain the appropriate amount. The State has not supplied a whole lot of PPE for Town staff use but has supplied PPE that are being distributed to other entities in Town.

Answering further questions from the Council, Mr. Maniscalco stated that no Council members are getting hazard pay and he does not believe that the Town employs any Council member's relatives. Mr. Maniscalco stated that

the Town could mandate the use of masks when the public is going to use the vestibule. Hand sanitizer will not be offered in the vestibule because the Town does not have enough. Mr. Maniscalco stated that although a vestibule will help employees with less contact with the public, it will not eliminate all of the risks.

B. Resolution Amending the April 20, 2020, Resolution Implementing a Hazard Pay System to Town Employees

WHEREAS, on April 20, 2020, the South Windsor Town Council approved a resolution implementing a Hazard Pay System to Town Employees; and

WHEREAS, Town Employees would receive a stipend of \$200 per week if their work group is required to work from a Town facility, and if the employee works the entire week; and

WHEREAS, the stipend began the week of April 13, 2020, and was approved to run through May 20, 2020; and

WHEREAS, it is felt that the end date for Hazard Pay should be amended to end on May 8, 2020; and

WHEREAS, many of our residents have been furloughed, have lost their jobs and their ability to provide for their families, and are facing an uncertain financial future; and

WHEREAS, small and large businesses alike in South Windsor are facing financial difficulties; and

WHEREAS, many first responders work daily under a far greater threat and do not receive hazard pay; and

WHEREAS, many friends, neighbors, and residents work at grocery stores, pharmacies, hardware stores, retirement homes, and school cafeteria staff work to provide needed services without hazard pay; and

WHEREAS, hazard pay does not create a safe environment for our Town employees

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the South Windsor Town Council hereby amends the April 20, 2020, approved resolution implementing hazard pay to Town employees to end on May 8, 2020.

Councilor Maneeley withdrew this resolution.

C. Resolution Creating a Safe Working Environment for Town Employees when they are Dealing with the Public at Town Hall and at the Police Department

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town of South Windsor shall create safe spaces at the Town Hall and at the Police Department to allow the public to interact with Town staff and public safety staff in such a fashion that there is no direct contact with the public and that all communication is conducted from behind a safe plexiglass wall and any information such as paperwork, money, etc. is transferred through a protective slot to prevent any possible transmission of the coronavirus through this transaction; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the safe space will mirror and copy what the Town of Vernon has done in their Town Hall and Police Department, as shown in attached **Exhibit N**.

Mayor Paterna stated that there is a vestibule being constructed at the Town Hall and the Police Department already has the ability for their window to act as a vestibule; Mayor Paterna questioned how this resolution should be handled?

Answering questions from the Council, Mr. Maniscalco explained that the vestibule would have a computer and keyboard in it. The window in the vestibule is small because there is a shortage of plexiglass and that was the most the Town could get.

Councilor Delnicki withdrew the resolution.

D. Resolution Implementing Hazard Pay to the South Windsor Police Department

WHEREAS, The Governor for the State of Connecticut on March 10, 2020, declared an Emergency and a Public Health Emergency due to the outbreak of Coronavirus also known as COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, The Town Manager of South Windsor on March 13, 2020, declared an Emergency and a Public Health Emergency due to their being a presumptive positive case of coronavirus with the Town monitoring a second individual who traveled from an area affected by COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, The Governor of the State of Connecticut has mandated all non-essential businesses close due to the potential of COVID-19 infection and spread;

WHEREAS, Municipal Police business is considered essential and although safety precautions are taking place increased risk still exists; and

WHEREAS, many of the officers do not have the ability to self-quarantine to keep their families safe; and

WHEREAS, there have been multiple documented instances where Police Officers have come in contact with people carrying or exposed to COVID-19;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, The Town Council of South Windsor in recognition of the potentially dangerous work done by Police Officers throughout the pandemic wishes to implement a hazard pay system, starting April 13, 2020, for the Police Officers identified on attachment **Exhibit O**, until May 20, 2020, at such time the Council will revisit the current situation to make a further determination if hazard pay shall continue. In the event the Governor allows non-essential businesses to reopen and school goes back into session sooner said hazard pay shall stop immediately. To be eligible for a \$350 weekly hazard pay stipend employees must meet the following criteria:

- Be scheduled to work
- · Attend work for the full week; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the funding for Hazard pay shall come from the Economic Development Professional Account 11330300-00320. Town staff should seek FEMA reimbursement for expended Hazard Pay and, if reimbursable, shall return reimbursed funds to the Economic Development Professional Account 11330300-00320.

Was made by Councilor Lopez Seconded by Councilor Hockenberry

Answering questions from the Council, Mr. Maniscalco explained that the Police Department would be receiving \$350.00 rather than \$200.00 like employees at the Town Hall because first, it is important to recognize that the Police Department is the Town's first responders who go out to all of the medical calls so, therefore, have greater exposure. Secondly, it was stated at the last meeting that the Police Department preferred to have a day off rather than getting paid, but it was calculated out and would cost

approximately \$900.00 per week, so it was felt giving \$350.00 would be more cost effective for the Town. Mr. Maniscalco explained further that Mrs. Vanessa Perry would sent out an email to Chief Custer on a weekly basis to get a list of the employees that are eligible for the hazard pay.

Mayor Paterna called for a vote on the motion; it was approved unanimously.

Deputy Mayor Pendleton recused herself from Item 13. E.

E. Resolution Implementing Hazard Pay to the South Windsor Volunteer Fire Department

WHEREAS, The Governor for the State of Connecticut on March 10, 2020, declared an Emergency and a Public Health Emergency due to the outbreak of Coronavirus also known as COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, The Town Manager of South Windsor on March 13, 2020, declared an Emergency and a Public Health Emergency due to their being a presumptive positive case of coronavirus with the Town monitoring a second individual who traveled from an area affected by COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, The Governor of the State of Connecticut has mandated all nonessential businesses close due to the potential of COVID-19 infection and spread; and

WHEREAS, Fire Department business is considered essential and although safety precautions are taking place increased risk still exists;

WHEREAS, many of the volunteers at the Fire Department do not have the ability to self-guarantine to keep their families safe; and

WHEREAS, there have been multiple documented instances where fire fighters have come in contact with people carrying or exposed to COVID-19

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, The Town Council of South Windsor in recognition of the potentially dangerous work done by fire fighters throughout the pandemic wishes to implement a hazard pay system, starting April 13, 2020, for all South Windsor volunteer fire fighters until May 20, 2020, at such time the Council will revisit the current situation to make a further determination if hazard pay shall continue. In the event the Governor allows non-essential businesses to reopen and school goes back into session sooner said hazard pay shall stop immediately. To be eligible for a \$13 per call per person in addition to the \$9 base per person per call, fire fighters must respond to a call during the above-mentioned dates. Those eligible for the hazard pay from April 13, 2020, through April 24, 2020, are demonstrated on the attached **Exhibit P**; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the funding for Hazard pay shall come from the Economic Development Professional Account 11330300-00320. Town staff should seek FEMA reimbursement for expended Hazard Pay and, if reimbursable, shall return reimbursed funds to the Economic Development Professional Account 11330300-00320.

Was made by Councilor Evans Seconded by Councilor Delnicki

Mr. Maniscalco informed the Council that after discussions were held with Chief Cooney, it was felt that the best option for payment was to follow the \$13.00 that the Federal Legislation was proposing, but did not go through.

Mayor Paterna called for a vote on the motion; it was approved unanimously.

F. Discussion Item; Park & Recreation Summer Camp (requested by Councilor Snyder) (Ray Favreau will be present)

Councilor Snyder explained that she had asked for this discussion because she has been getting a lot of inquiries from residents in Town about what is going to happen with Summer Camp. Councilor Snyder also questioned if Mr. Favreau could explain his challenges during this pandemic.

Mr. Ray Favreau, Director of Parks & Recreation, explained that at this time, it is prudent to wait for the anticipated recommendations from the Governor's Office and guidance from the Re-Opening Connecticut Advisory Committee. The Park & Recreation Department is working on alternative ideas. The department's goal is to deliver whatever services that can be provided, taking into consideration stipulations that will be put into place. As far as Summer Camps, the first thing that needs to be determined is if the schools will be canceled for the rest of the school year. If school is canceled, will there be a greater need for camps/childcare a month earlier than normal, and will the Parks & Recreation Department have access to the schools? The camp's size will be determined by the restrictions through the State. One requirement is to take each camper's temperature. The thermometers that we would like to use are back-ordered until July 1, 2020. The Park & Recreation Department is concerned about the limited enrollment that will be allowed at Summer Camp. A survey was conducted with all of the previous camp families and received about a 30% return. About 60% of the respondents were very likely to sign up for Summer Camp, 30% somewhat The Park & Recreation likely, and 9-10% said they would not enroll. Department will take all necessary precautions, follow all orders, and will run everything by Heather Oatis in the Health Department, as is being done presently. There are a number of activities that might not happen, and the Park & Recreation Department will have to restructure and come up with There are also challenges regarding Veterans new prices for camp. Memorial Pool, rentals, large scale events, and sport team activities. The parks in South Windsor have remained open and are being used. Thankfully there is enough open space and trails for residents to use. Other items that are being looked at are to customize the concert series, tennis lessons, swimming lessons, specialty camps, and movie night.

Answering questions from the Council, Mr. Favreau explained that the Park & Recreation post activities on Facebook every Thursday at 10:00 a.m. These activities can be viewed by going onto the Park & Recreation Facebook or on the website.

Councilor Pendleton requested that the Town Manager oversee the Park & Recreation Department on the planned activities, including the fees being charged.

Answering further questions, Mr. Favreau explained that the Park & Recreation Department discussed having a daily virtual activity each day but has agreed on a weekly activity. There is a resource guide on the website under the Parks & Recreation Department, where families can find virtual programming.

G. Resolution Authorizing the Town Manager to Execute a Contract Extension for the Curbside Collection and Disposal of Refuse and Recyclables Through June 30, 2030

WHEREAS, the Town has negotiated favorable terms with All American Waste, LLC for the collection and disposal of refuse and recycling; and

WHEREAS, All American Waste shall properly collect, transport, and dispose of all residential municipal solid waste and recyclables collected in South Windsor; and

WHEREAS, an increase in unit costs for Collection services during the fifth, seventh and ninth years based upon a Consumer Price Index adjustment not to exceed 3%; and

WHEREAS, All American Waste shall agree to a municipal solid waste (MSW) disposal charge of \$80 per ton charge for the two-year term of July 1, 2020 - June 30, 2022, and a 2.5% increase thereafter with the extension of the All American Waste collection agreement through June 30, 2030; and

WHEREAS, All American Waste shall agree to a municipal single stream recycling disposal charge of \$25/ton for the first year, \$50/ton for the second year, \$77/ton in the third, \$80/ton in the fourth year and 2.5% annual increases thereafter through June 30, 2030. All American Waste shall agree to pay to the Town a monthly rebate for single-stream recycling based on Official Board Markets (OBM) values for the duration of the contract. All other conditions from the previous agreements would remain the same

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the South Windsor Town Council hereby authorizes the Town Manager to sign a contract extension with All American Waste, LLC, for the curbside collection of residential refuse and recyclables through June 30, 2030.

Was made by Councilor Lydecker Seconded by Deputy Mayor Pendleton

Answering questions from the Council, Mr. Tony Manfre, Superintendent of Pollution Control, explained that for this upcoming Fiscal Year, the Town would be saving about \$41,000. For the budget proposed, the Town is going in with a \$90.00 tip fee for the MSCW and \$115.00 fee for the bulky waste. The 10-year contract should realize almost \$200,000 in savings. Mr. Manfre explained that the Town usually does not do 10-year contracts, but in this situation, it works out for both the Town and All American Waste. All American Waste is a South Windsor company, and the Town knows their service and reliability. The prices in this contract have no changes to the current services. In the last year of the contract, 2030, the Town will be paying a \$97.47 tip fee. Mr. Manfre stated that he is comfortable going forward with a 10-year contract with this company.

Mayor Paterna called for a vote on the motion; it was approved unanimously.

H. Resolution Regarding a Dump Truck Lease

WHEREAS, the South Windsor Town Council previously approved in the 2019-2020 Budget the acquisition of equipment, including a new dump truck, for the Parks and Recreation Department: Account No. 15150400 00442; and

WHEREAS, the truck is to be leased through the Municipal Leasing Credit Corporation over a five-year term in the total amount of \$76,760.00 pursuant to a Lease Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the South Windsor Town Council hereby authorizes the Town Manager to execute the Lease Agreement for the truck on behalf of the Town of South Windsor.

Was made by Deputy Mayor Pendleton Seconded by Councilor Snyder

Answering questions from the Council, Mr. Maniscalco explained that this lease is a lease to purchase.

Councilor Pendleton requested that the Parks Department provide the Council with an equipment replacement schedule.

Answering further questions, Mr. Maniscalco stated that this would be a five-year lease for a total of \$76,760. This lease to purchase was approved in the current budget, but the Town had some issues with the leasing company. The company wanted a separate resolution from the Council and would not use the approved budget.

Mayor Paterna called for a vote on the motion; it was approved unanimously.

WHEREAS, the Town is looking at these properties again to purchase development rights in conjunction with the Connecticut Farmland Trust and the State of Connecticut; and

WHEREAS, the State has said that the appraisals from Fiscal Year 2016/2017 are too old and would need to be done again

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the South Windsor Town Council hereby authorizes Town Manager, Michael Maniscalco to have appraisals done, and to take funds from the Town Council Professional Account to pay for these appraisals; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the funding to the Town Council Professional Account will be reimbursed by Open Space Funds if the Town, Connecticut Farmland Trust, and the State of Connecticut go forward with the purchase of development rights.

Was made by Councilor Hockenberry Seconded by Deputy Mayor Pendleton

Mayor Paterna informed the Council that this property is at the corner of Ferry Lane and Main Street and goes all the way down to the river.

Councilor Snyder stated that this resolution is looking at an appraisal of 58.84 acres for the Birden Farm and 134.8 acres for the Raymond Farm. There is a lot of land on both properties that are flood plains, so is the Town getting an appraisal on flood property that nobody can build on? Mayor Paterna explained that the Town is following the process of the State. The State of Connecticut purchases the development rights of the entire property. Mayor Paterna then informed the Council that with the new partner, Connecticut Farmland Trust, the amount of money contributed by the Town could be reduced. In this process, the Town purchases the development rights while the family still owns the property and pays taxes on the property. The property owner cannot sell the property to a developer, but if the family decides to sell the property, they can only sell it to another farmer.

Mayor Paterna called for a vote on the motion; it was approved unanimously.

K. Discussion item: Review of a Policy to Provide for the Display of Commemorative Flags (requested by Mayor Paterna)

Mayor Paterna explained that Councilor Delnicki and he have been working on guidelines for a flag flying policy and an application. On the guidelines and the application, items with red strikes are areas that have been eliminated, and anything in blue are additions. Mayor Paterna then stated that there is a change in the application. The first line says "A request for a

flag to be flown at South Windsor Town Hall" and should say "A request for a flag to be flown in South Windsor." There are multiple locations where a flag can be flown, not only at Town Hall. The Council will have to discuss where the flag should be flown when an application comes before the Council. On the proposed guidelines, where it says Commemorative or Organization Flags must be approved by a majority vote of the Town Council, or the Town Manager, flags flown according to U.S. Flag Code should be added. Mayor Paterna requested that Council member review the application and guidelines, and a resolution will come before the Council on May 18, 2020.

Councilor Snyder informed the Council that on the application, it is stated that "The Commemorative Flag is to be flown exclusively at Town Hall." Mayor Paterna stated that Town Hall should be eliminated.

Councilor Delnicki suggested that the locations where a flag could be flown be added into the application. Also, state at one of the locations, so people will not think the flag will be flown at each location.

Mayor Paterna explained that when the Council approves an application, the Council will have to decide what location the flag will be flown.

Deputy Mayor Pendleton requested that comply with the U.S. Flag Code be placed at the bottom in the last statement instead of where the Mayor suggested on the guidelines.

Mr. Favreau reminded the Council that there are many flag poles in many of the Town's parks.

Deputy Mayor Pendleton also requested that nothing but the military flag or POW flag be flown at Veterans Memorial Park.

Councilor Delnicki requested that Ray Favreau provide the Council with a list of all of the parks that have flag poles.

RESPONSE:

STATEWIDE- As of March 10, 2020 Governor Lamont has issued a Public Health Emergency and a Declaration of Emergency for the entire state. Since then, through executive order, he has limited public meetings to no more than 10 people per CDC, closed restaurants and bars to dine in services, closed all schools till April 20. The State has identified and made available 5 drive through testing locations but you will need a doctors not before you will be directed to get a test.

On March 22, 2020 the State released a list of all non-essential in person business functions that must remain closed until further notice.

April 2, 2020 the Governor signed a new executive order that said all municipalities must choose to issue a tax forbearance or reduced interest rates for individuals and businesses that can proved they have been impacted by COVID-19. Given the information that is available staff are currently recommending the Council approve a forbearance for 90 days. That said, we are still waiting on guidance from OPM as to who would be eligible for the forbearance. We must have an answer to OPM by April 25th. At this point my thought is the Council will have this as an item to vote on for your meeting April 20th. If the recommendation changes after the release from OPM I will let you know.

On April 17th, the Governor issued another Executive order mandating all residents wear masks when in public. This executive order has also translated to all essential employees who must be in contact with other employees or the public. We are currently in the process of trying to source additional masks and materials to make masks for all employees as well as policy and protocol for how and when they must wear the masks. The order will take effect 8pm on April 20, 2020.

Starting April 17, 2020, the State has made special testing facilities for Fire, EMS and Police officers. They are only offered in our region on certain days and at certain times but expedited testing will be extremely helpful for keeping people in the field. The State is also working on increasing testing using a new saliva based test. They estimate they can potentially see 10,000 tests conducted a day. We will need to see daily numbers of those infected decrease steadily over a few weeks before conversations of getting back to work come up. Additionally, I would not expect social gatherings to be allowed until July at the earliest.

On April 29, 2020 the Governor's office through CCM and COST held a disaster restoration webinar. Town Staff participated in the webinar and found this pandemic as well as the business closures will be managed similarly to restoration from a hurricane. As a result, Town management is going to be working to identify a Long-term Recovery Committee and Coordinator. This group will be the middle communications entity to the statewide regional recovery efforts.

Additionally, the Department of Labor has released Town by Town unemployment labor data. I have included that information as an attachment to this report. I hope it will be helpful for the Council while it deliberates over the budget. This information has been requested multiple times over the last few weeks from municipalities.

The Department of Public Health is about 2 weeks out from launching its new Contact database. This system is being designed to stop the chain of transmission. This program is being staffed by 300 DPH staff and another 400 public health related volunteers. The goal is to speak with people who are sick and track where and who they may have come in contact with and then notify people who are at a higher exposure and request they selfquarantine for 14 days.

LOCAL- On March 13, 2020 after having a visitor come in the Town hall and tell staff that they have been caring for a family member on self-quarantine I issued a Declaration of Emergency and Public Health Emergency. The Emergency Operations Center is open in a monitor status. All Town Departments have reviewed and are ready to implement their Continuity of Operation Plans (COOPS) to ensure that we can still deliver services to the residents within the community.

Housing measures are in place in the event that staff are not allowed to leave work. We have divided the workforce into two groups and have directed one group to stay home and self-quarantine while the other group works. The groups will switch on a weekly basis. The Chief of Police and I issued Travel Authorization letters to all staff in the event public travel is shut down.

Consistent with the Governors executive order, on essential employees only, we have reduced the Town workforce to a skeleton crew. Staff are required to stay in their respective department unless it is absolutely required for them to accomplish their job.

All out of state Staff travel has been canceled. All on sight meetings with more than 20 attendees have been canceled. All other meetings with less than 20 attendees that may occur with outside attendees are being reviewed by the Town Manager and Assistant

Town Managers before they are approved. All staff attempting to return to work after a vacation must receive approval from the Assistant Town Manager/HR Director and Town Manager based on where they went and the activities they participated in. To date, we have 1 employee on mandatory quarantine. We are aware of one volunteer fire fighter who has tested positive but did not contract COVID-19 from work done in South Windsor.

Staff have reached out to our low income senior population to determine their status related to food and other basic supplies. Staff have modified the way they will interact with the public moving forward. Every public interaction will start with questions asking them if they have symptoms or have been around anyone with symptoms.

We are in the process of preparing for some type of soft reopening. As a result, we have built a vestibule in the Town Hall for residents to meet with Staff and pass information through a slot. While this does not completely eliminate the risk to staff and public it does reduce some risks.

On April 28, 2020 I signed a mutual aid agreement with the Town of East Windsor and Suffield WPC. The agreement will ensure a backup certified staff in the event our staff are struck with illness. The agreement will only remain in place for as long as the pandemic continues. At the completion of the Pandemic I would like to bring forward a more long term agreement for the Council to consider.



On April 30th, 2020 the Town launched a number of new demographic data charts specifically focused on information about South Windsor. It can be found at: https://coronavirus-response-south-windsor-ct-southwindsor-ct.hub.arcgis.com/.

The Current Status of each department is as follows:

- Town Hall- Closed to Public still operational for virtual business and by appointment
- Community Center- Closed to the public
- Food Bank- Order by appointment
- Police Department- Lobby open to the public/ Precautions to limit exposure are being taken
- Park& Rec- Closed to the public including playgrounds and skate park/ Field & Park maintenance ongoing
- Public Works- Closed to the public/ Field work ongoing
- Fire Departments- Closed to the public

In terms of Committee, Board and Commission meetings, I have canceled all of the meetings that will not serve a required purpose for the current operation of the Town. Public meetings that do serve an immediate purpose will be closed to the public, broadcast via TV and internet. Participants will need to have their temperature taken when they arrive and public comment can be made through an email.

Rumor has it that the Town of South Windsor is thinking about purchasing the property, but some council members are against the concept of the property being designated as Open Space.

My family has lived in South Windsor for over ten years. Commercial and residential properties have been built up and the population of South Windsor has grown. While the need to develop and upgrade to keep up with demand is good, it is also imperative that we maintain some of the charm that makes South Windsor so special!

Keeping Willow Brook as an open Space will benefit the residents of our town in many ways. Here are some suggestions - the driving range can be used by adults and the recreation center; charge a fee so as to bring in income for maintenance. The restaurant can be leased to provide meals for people using the premises or rented out for occasions. The property has a paved path that can be used as a walking trail, three seasons in a year. 
past will be made up with tax payer money from OUR TOWN. Their bail out basically is from future positive cash flow starting when and if Our Town takes over these profit centers.

What is in the resolution

Preamble:

- ▶ Governor on March 10, 2020 declared an Emergency and a Public Health Emergency;
- ▶ Town Manager on March 13, 2020 declared an Emergency and a Public Health Emergency
- Municipal business is considered essential and although Town offices are closed to the public, much of the business of the Town is still conducted in person placing employees at risk of contracting coronavirus;

Resolution:

- Starts April13, 2020 and ends May 20, 2020
 - ▶ Allowed to end sooner if school goes back and non-essential businesses reopen.
 - Allows for the Council to reconsider extension or ending on May 20, 2020
 - April 13th was the date the Town went to an extremely limited staffing due to Governors Executive Order
- ▶ Provides \$200 for each employee that works for an entire week.



Who is Eligible

- Current staffing is approximately 47 FTE per week (Normally we are over 100FTE)
- ▶ Only staff coming into work must have an interaction with the public

(ALL ESSENTIAL EMPLOYEES WHO CAN WORK FROM HOME MUST WORK FROM HOME)

▶ Staff that are home are asked to accomplish as much work as possible but are **NOT ELIGIBLE** for Hazard pay






How is it getting paid for

- ▶ Hazard pay shall come from the Economic Development Professional Account 11330300-00320 (Language from the Resolution)
 - ▶ Fund was created by the Council to give loans to the Cannabis industry to promote that work in South Windsor
 - Funds came from contingency
 - ▶ It has been determined by the Town Attorney that giving Loans from Municipal funds is not allowed by State Statute
 - Additionally, it is recommended that the Town apply for reimbursement from FEMA to replenish the fund if possible







What have we done to keep employees safe


- Switched to A, B, C schedule to allow for social distancing and continuity of services in the event of mass infection amongst staff;
- Weekly deep cleaning of all Town Facilities;
- Mandatory quarantine of staff because of travel, exposure and symptoms;
- Temperature taking of all staff on a daily basis (anyone with a temp over 100.4F is sent home for quarantine);
- Closure of all Town facilities to public (but maintained all service delivery through appointment and public interactions as required);
- PPE distribution to all staff.





Some examples of Essential employees at work in their own words


- ▶ Waste Water:
 - "Our biosolids are not stabilized meaning that the virus is potentially active within them."
- Town Clerk:
 - "we must administer an oath in person to the individuals getting married, have them sign the license in our presence after administering the oath, and then accept payment and process the document (we must sign the license in three fields and then make a copy for our records). We have been performing these tasks directly outside Town Hall."
- Building Department:
 - "Mike and I mix with the public on a daily basis and bring back (to the hive) potential exposure. This practice is also common to Planning and Engineering. This does not include the casual interaction of other building personnel excepting packages/mail from public or delivery persons"
- Youth and Family Services:
 - "Staff takes in donations face to face, even though there is a box out front to limit that. Today we had a truck load delivered by a resident who posted on FB. Would never fit in the box!"
 - "Staff meets with people out front to have them provide proof of income and to sign documents for energy assistance and other financial assistance programs."














Hand Sanitizer Station for Visitors

Main Safe Space Wall – Height – 8 feet




Monitor is behind Plexiglass Wall




