F. Discussion Item: General Government Budget for Fiscal Year 2017/2018 (Requested by Town Manager, Matthew B. Galligan)

Mr. Galligan presented the 2017/2018 General Government budget to the Council, as shown in attached **Exhibit A**.

Council members thanked the Town Manager for managing the Town's budget appropriately and voiced their disappointment with the problems with the State budget.

Answering questions from the Council, Mr. Galligan explained that the Town and Board of Education are expecting reductions in the State revenue in the amount of \$6.8 million dollars. In order to get to a 3% tax increase there would need to be cuts in the amount of \$4.6 million dollars to the current budget and to get to a 2% tax increase, the cuts would need to be in the amount of \$5.5 million dollars to the current budget. Mr. Galligan explained that he would like to work on the cuts with the Superintendent of Schools and come back to the Council and Board of Education with those suggestions.

Councilor Anwar suggested a strategy of using the fund balance and then replenishing it if the State gives more aid then what is being anticipated at this time. Mr. Galligan explained that this is one item that Rating Agencies watch. Mr. Galligan stated that another strategy that could be considered is if revenue comes in, a public hearing could be held to change the number of the budget which could restore services that had to be eliminated. A supplemental tax bill could also be sent out after the State budget is complete. Councilor Anwar said he if not inclined of having residents receive two tax bills.

Mr. Galligan stated that he would like the Council to have a goal for the budget. After receiving that, he and the Superintendent could sit down to figure out how to reach that goal and then go back to the Council and Board of Education for further discussions. Mr. Galligan explained that the Town will be looking for new revenues through inspection fees. There needs to be a Board of Education budget by April15th.

Council members discussed different scenarios. Mr. Galligan reminded the Council that whatever is cut this year will need to be replaced next year, but if services are cut, the Town will not get those back. Items that will be reviewed for additional revenue through the Town are inspection fees and personal property audits.

Councilor members directed the Town Manager to sit down with the Superintendent of Schools to come up with ideas where cuts could be considered and in future meetings these cuts would be discussed.






