3. Mayor's Remarks

Mayor Pendleton thanked the Board of Education, Planning and Zoning Commission, Economic Development Commission, and Town staff for their time and efforts in the betterment of the community.

4. Presentations

Superintendent of South Windsor Public Schools, Dr. Kate Carter reported on the School District's enrollment growth and detailed current enrollment numbers, historical figures, as well as projected enrollment for the Town, which can be read in detail in **Exhibit A**. Dr. Carter further explained how school enrollment has been much higher than projected, and that increasingly higher costs are associated with keeping up with the growth.

Mr. Michael Maniscalco, Town Manager presented a report depicting the Town's five year budget history as well as projected expenditures for the following four years, which can be read in detail in **Exhibit B**. Mr. Maniscalco also reported on the Town's mill rate history, Grand List growth history and clarified tax abatements.

5. Items for Discussion

A. Future Planning and Development

Mayor Pendleton welcomed questions and discussions from all members.

Some items discussed included the School District's fiscal situation, levels of school enrollment, and the promotion of commercial development to help grow the Grand List figures.

There was a consensus to reconvene in two months for a second Quad Board Meeting. In the interim, a Working Group consisting of two members from Town Council,

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Planning and Zoning, Board of Education, and Economic Development Commission will meet to continue discussion.

5. Adjournment

At 9:00 p.m., Councilor Andrew Paterna made a motion to adjourn the Special Meeting. Deputy Mayor King seconded the motion, and it was approved unanimously.



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


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Since 2015, the K-5 student population has grown by 534 students, or 30.5%

Since 2015, the K-5 student population has grown by 534 students or 30.5%. During this same timeframe, the number of K-5 classroom teachers grew by 23 FTE due to increasing enrollment. The cost of 23 additional classroom teachers is just over \$2,000,000.
