Town Manager's Report July 2018

July 2nd Town Council Meeting:

Please be advised that I will not be at the July 2nd Town Council meeting, as it is my 43rd wedding anniversary and I will be celebrating that with my family out of state.

Town Attorney Contract:

I have sent the Town Attorney's Contract to the Council. The contract has a 30-day termination stipulation, meaning it can be terminated at will without cause. The contract also states that if the Town Attorney comes to meetings, and said meetings run 4-5 hours, the Town Attorney will only be charging for two hours of his time. I am going to leave this contract very simple, like the ones that we have used in the past. Therefore I think that the Town Council can either approve the Town Attorney and I will sign the contract, or the Council can approve the contract and I will take care of the rest.

Economic Development:

I have enclosed a review of a proposal that I received from the Connecticut Economic Resource Center (CERC) for Economic Development Consulting Services. CERC has been a very strong advocate of economic development throughout the State of Connecticut. We used them many years ago to do the feasibility study for Evergreen Walk, as well as the feasibility study for the CT Studios project. CERC is now in the business of doing economic development on a daily basis for

many municipalities. I believe that when you look at the proposal, you will see some great staff that I have worked with before who would greatly benefit South Windsor.

The total cost of this project would be under \$45,000. This will give you a self-assessment of what we would like to do This cost would include a branding implementation plan for \$6,500 as well as the annual website fee and membership, which the Town already participates in. That allows us to put all of our properties that are up for sale, or economic development center programs, on their website. The total cost also includes \$80/hour economic development support, which would be one person coming into Town once a week to create programs and policies. This person would also attend the Economic Development Commission meetings or Redevelopment Agency meetings as needed. I would like the Council to review this contract, as it is something that is not currently in the budget, and it may need to come from contingency. Hopefully at the July 17th meeting we can further discuss and approve this contract. I think it will help the Town to move forward in its economic development issues.

I have also met with a representative from the Buxton Company, which is a national company that looks to help municipalities throughout the country in providing better economic development clients. I met the representative in Las Vegas, and I will have them come sometime in September to give a presentation. I believe they will look for more national clients as well. I think between CERC and Buxton we could run a very inexpensive economic development program that will help promote the goals and objectives of the Town.

Before and After School Care Assessment Committee Meetings:

I have scheduled two meetings of the Before and After School Care Assessment Committee for Tuesday the 26th of June and Wednesday the 27th of June. I am aware that we have a deadline date of July 17th to come back with a report. Depending upon the results of those meetings, we may have to schedule a few others. While I am away, Vanessa Perry or Scott Roberts can hold additional meetings in my stead. I will be back in the office the week of July 9th. At that time we will follow up on and finalize any reports that need to get back to the Town Council.

Additional Meetings:

I will be attending a Planning & Zoning meeting on Tuesday June 26th at 7:30 to discuss economic development prospects for the I-291 corridor. There seems to be some indication from the Planning and Zoning Commission that they will be changing some zoning in that area, and I will have an opportunity at the meeting to express my opinion for that particular site. Also, I will attend the Economic Development Committee meeting on June 27th to discuss the Mayor's TV program as well as economic development strategies, including the CERC contract mentioned earlier. I will bring the committee up to date and see how they want to move of forward in some their economic development programs. We will also discuss a tax abatement for Electro Methods, a company that has been long-standing here in Town. We would like to keep them here intact, as they have been a strong manufacturer in the Town.

Bid Agreements:

We did get approval from the State to go out to bid for Phase 3 of Avery St, as well as to go out to bid for the Buckland Road sidewalk program. That information just came to my office on Monday, June 25th. I have signed the agreements and sent them to our staff. Now we can start moving forward following DOT guidelines, and we can get these projects accomplished.

Staff Meeting:

The Staff Meeting on Thursday, June 28th will be a discussion with all of our staff members about the report from the Transparency Task Force Committee. We will be going over the programs to see how we can implement those changes and keep the public fully informed on the everyday happenings in the Town of South Windsor. We will implement the programs where necessary, and staff will be empowered to do so and to work with all our boards and commissions on those issues.

Car Burglaries/Car Thefts:

There continue to be almost constant car burglaries across Hartford county. There are probably dozens of groups of youths who go out nightly into various towns to look through unlocked cars and take items of value. They frequently take any vehicle found with the keys in it and "joyride" with it until it runs out of gas. The youths, typically under 17, are juveniles and are aware that they face minimal consequences from the courts. They are not afraid to engage officers in pursuits. (Our policy strongly limits pursuits). There have been many media accounts of the same youths being arrested numerous times for car thefts. This criminal activity continues because the thieves are successful every time they go out. We continue to urge our citizens to lock their cars every single time they exit and to take the keys with them.

Upcoming Events:

School Resource Officers Host "3-on-3" Basketball Camp:

This summer our two School Resource Officers, Ofc. Ben White and Ofc. Tina Roy, are hosting a 3-on-3 basketball league. Approximately 30 South Windsor High School students will participate in this program and will play games three days a week at the High School and end in a tournament on August 1st. In addition to the basketball competition, participants will be presented with some life skills presentations such as resume building, interview preparation, personal financial management, drug abuse resistance, and physical wellness. The program is free for participants and is grant funded through the South Windsor Community Foundation.

The attendees will also participate Community Giveback events. This is a great program to build upon our Community Policing and Community Outreach efforts.

SWPD and Office of Emergency Management:

On June 20th SWPD Command Staff members participated Statewide in a **Emergency Operations Center exercise hosted** by SW Emergency Manager Jay Gonzalez. The assembled department heads were given a weather event scenario to deal with. Collectively we worked through numerous "injects" that included well contamination, wide-spread power outages, fuel shortages, staffing concerns and other challenges. This exercise highlights the need to be prepared for weather related emergencies.

We will continue to point people www.Ready.gov for preparedness tips and encourage them to prepare for the unexpected weather events that we continue to experience here.

Food Drive for SW Food and Fuel Bank:

A food drive was held on June 16th at both Geissler's Supermarket and Stop and Shop. The volunteers from SWPD, Hartford-Evergreen Freemasons, SW Triad Ambulance Service of Manchester collected 2250 items and over \$1400.00 in cash donations for our citizens in need.

Bicycle Patrols:

Thanks to renewed interest in bicycle patrols we now have 4 officers certified in Police Mountain Bike training. The bikes will be used locally at special events, parks and other activities that lend themselves to two-wheeled transport (and it's a great way to interact with citizens and get exercise). The certified officers are Corporal Mark Halibozek, Officer David Johnson, Officer Bill Eastwood and Officer Lawren Owens.

Bears:

In what has become an annual springtime occurrence, a small bear has been active in the morning in the east side of town. (Foster, Valley View, Deepwood Drive, etc.) The animal appears healthy and is not aggressive. We have not received any reports since June 23rd, but if seen please do not approach the animal. Street Services

Crews continue work on drainage repairs on Dart Hill Rd. and are making steady progress. Curb and lawn damage repairs are nearly completed. There are only a couple of driveway aprons to repair as well.

One town crew conducted a repair on Pleasant Valley Rd., removing a deteriorating headwall and making pipe repairs to ultimately stop erosion in this area. As the pipe was dislodged, soils from above were being carried into a nearby body of water also causing the embankment to severely degrade. While working at this jobsite, the crew discovered a rapidly forming depression in the roadway 200' east of their project which was over a water main. Their due diligence paid off as MDC did in fact have a water main break in that area.

The management team has been working to complete a new work order system to include an inventory component. This will prove very helpful by providing a min/max system to right size our current inventory, eliminating waste and ensuring adequate materials will always be at the ready.

Potholes continue to be our nemesis and crews are assigned as manpower and weather permit. Crews, on average, put down between 1.5 and 2 tons of asphalt daily when the crew is out on pothole detail.

Town crews installed a dry well on Griffin Rd west of the intersection with Graham Rd. This is a low point, and water sheds off the road in the area which causes constant wet and muddy conditions. This dry well will have the capacity to collect the water and slowly dissipate it into the surrounding soil.

Street sweeping concluded for the season. Crews collected several hundred yards of debris from our roads this season which would otherwise be blown around or be washed into the storm water basins, which ultimately leads into the Long Island Sound.

The department has begun the project to widen Nevers Rd near Linda Lane. The lane widths were reduced in this area due to utilities being too close to the road. The department has been working closely with Eversource, Frontier and Cox to move their utility lines onto the new poles so this road resurfacing project can be properly completed.

The sign shop replaced or repaired several damaged signs during the month and has fabricated several new signs for different town departments. The sign shop also received a new printer/cutter which will greatly reduce project time on certain applications and add more versatility to the department.

Inspections

During the month of June 2018, the South Windsor Health Department (SWHD) inspected at several temporary events. The three biggest events were the Strawberry Festival, Farmer's Market, and the Greater Hartford Food Truck Festival. There was a total of 37 temporary food permits issued for the month. The Health Department also wrapped up inspecting the public pools at the local condominiums, gym, and rehabilitation center for the year.

With the warmer weather, this month was very busy with septic inspections and projects. There were two repair septic systems completely installed and third property started. The complete installation of a septic system requires soil testing to be performed, design recommendations to be drafted, a plan to be approved, a stake inspection, a bottom of excavation inspection, and final inspection before a permit to discharge can be issued.

Emergency Preparedness

The SWHD participated in an interactive program through the Department of Public Health, "Reaching At-Risk Populations: Whole Community Emergency Preparedness Training". This training highlighted unconventional ways to reach and plan for vulnerable populations within our town. These strategies will be implemented in future planning and drills.

The SWHD participated the 2018 in Emergency Preparedness and **Planning** Initiative (EPPI) Drill. The scenario that we were given was a hurricane that resulted in flooding and power loss. The SWHD exercised sending out a notification to all food service establishments in town via Everbridge and sharing well safety information with residents via social media. This was a great learning opportunity to test out functionality of the SWHD in the Emergency Operations Center and maintenance of the SWHD contact database.
