1. Proposed Water Pollution Control Budget, proposed Sewer User Charges, Surcharges, Sewer Assessment Schedules, and Septic Disposal Fees for Fiscal Year 2016/2017. And proposed change to Section 16.2.A "Sewer User Charges and the Collection Thereof" of the Town of South Windsor Water Pollution Control Authority Rules and Regulations - (See Attached).

Chairman Richard Aries called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. He stated that the public hearing is being held to present the proposed Water Pollution Control budget, proposed sewer user charges, surcharges, sewer assessment schedules, and septic disposal fees for fiscal year 2016/2017, and proposed change to Section 16.2.A of the Water Pollution Control Authority (WPCA) Rules and Regulations (see Exhibits A, B, C1 and C2). Ether Diaz, Recording Secretary read the Legal Notice as it was published in the Journal Inquirer (Exhibit A).

Chairman Aries turned the public hearing over to Mr. Fred Shaw to give a brief summary of the proposed budget. Mr. Shaw explained that the proposed expenditure budget is for the operation and maintenance of the Town's treatment plant; the entire system of 130 miles plus of sewer line and eleven pump stations. The proposed operation and maintenance budget is for a total of \$3,297,746. The debt service is \$312,210, capital expenditures are \$735,000; the operating reserve is \$686,157 and the replacement reserve is \$686,157 for a subtotal budget of \$5,211,313. The Water Pollution Control Authority has an annual operating budget of \$900. Therefore the total of the Water Pollution Control budget is \$5,212,213. Mr. Shaw also explained that the regulation change concerning Section 16.2.A "Sewer User Charges and the Collection Thereof", the purpose of the change is to reflect in more detail exactly how the user charges are computed.

Chairman added that the change being proposed for the regulations is in an effort to reflect a more accurate assessment of how the sewer charges are properly formulated. If anyone is interested in obtaining more details of how this formula was made, one could take a look at the minutes of the last month WPCA meeting where that matter was discussed at some length, said Chairman Aries.

Chairman Aries opened the public hearing for public participation. Mr. Robert Dickinson of 19 Birch Road, South Windsor, CT came before the Authority. He raised the subject on continuing equity between apartments and smaller condominiums. He explained that there are many more expensive apartments been built in Town and many people are now electing to pay rents for apartments rather than buying a condo. He expressed that he feels that the present system of the sewer rates do not address that matter. There will be a couple of ways of addressing that matter, said Mr. Dickinson. One would be to start off with a standard base fee per residence (apartment, condo, or house) and then go to the standard usage formula. The other way to improve it would be a continuation to adjust the standard fees from the present 84,000 gallons 65,000 gallons, "which is the actual usage", said Mr. Dickinson. He further expressed that the base rate would be an easier and fair way to address this matter because people in apartments are probably paying as much as people in condominiums.

Mr. Victor Berman of 16 Lavender Lane, South Windsor, CT also came before the Authority. He expressed that if he understands correctly, part of the sewer user bill is to provide maintenance of the storm sewers. He explained that he lives in a 55 community; the town does not come in and clean out their storm sewers at all. The residents pay for that. He asked if Town Council will consider maintenance of their storm sewers just like everybody else in Town. Chairman Richard Aries responded that unfortunately the Water Pollution Control Authority does not have that jurisdiction. He explained that the storm sewers are handled by the Town's Public Works Department. He recommended Mr. Berman to contact the Public Works Department directly to discuss any needs in that area. Chairman Aries asked for any other questions or comments from the public or members of the Authority. There been no further public participation, Chairman Aries declared the Public Hearing closed at 6:47 p.m.

Motion was made to adjourn the meeting at 6:47 p.m.

The motion was made by Mr. Ed Havens, Jr. and seconded by Mr. Donald Antaya. The motion carried unanimously.

**SEWER USE CHARGES AND
THE COLLECTION THEREOF**

16.1 Purpose. The purpose of this Regulation is to establish fair and reasonable charges for use of the South Windsor sewerage system and in connection therewith giving consideration to appropriate factors relating to the kind, quality, or extent of use of any property connected to or to be connected to the sewage system. This Regulation is further intended to establish an equitable basis of cost recovery of the industrial share of the local capital and debt service charges.

16.2 An annual sewer use charge shall be imposed on each residential, commercial and industrial building connected into the sewer system and discharging sewerage of any quality, character or quantity into the sewer system. The following methods for calculating rates are hereby prescribed:

- A. Sewer use charges, together with other sources of revenues, shall fund 100 percent of the costs for Pollution Control operation and maintenance (O & M) debt service, capital improvements and operating and replacement reserves, and shall be prorated among the several user categories (residential, commercial, small industrial and major industrial) based upon the quantity of equivalent sanitary wastewater discharged. A user charge shall be computed according to the following general formula:

$$\text{User Charge} = \frac{(C_t - C_R) \times Q_o}{Q_t}$$

$$\text{User Charge} = \frac{(C_t - (C_R + R_o)) \times Q_o}{Q_t}$$

Where:

C_t = Total annual cost for operation, debt service, capital projects, contributions to reserves.

C_R = Surcharges for removal of excess Total Suspended Solids (T.S.S.) and Biochemical Oxygen Demand (B.O.D.).

R_o = Other Sources of Revenue

- Septic Dumping Fees
- Permit Fees
- Assessments
- Interest & Lien Fees
- Connection Charges
- Grants/loans
- Transfers from Operating and Replacement Reserves
- Internal Services Transfers
- Investment Interest Earnings

Q_o = Annual individual user discharge (gallons)

Q_t = Total annual industrial/commercial and residential discharge (gallons)

~~Where C_e is the total annual cost for operation and maintenance C_R is the cost for removal of excess solids and B.O.D., Q_e is the sum of the individual user outflows (mgd), and Q_o is the quantity of an individual user outflow (mgd).~~

B. Residential User Charges

1. There shall be a uniform rate for single and multifamily residential buildings
2. A resident subject to a sewer user charge and found to be eligible by the Town of South Windsor Human Services Department for property tax relief under the State of Connecticut Qualifying Income for the Elderly and Totally Disabled Tax Relief Program shall have said user charge reduced by a percentage corresponding to the

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Program Explanation:

The Authority of seven members is appointed by the Town Council pursuant to Town Ordinance No. 103 for a term of six years. The powers, duties and responsibilities of the Water Pollution Control Authority are derived from Chapter 103 of the General Statutes.

The Water Pollution Control Authority has the responsibility of constructing and operating a sewage system, levying benefit assessments, awarding construction contracts, selecting engineers, applying for State and Federal funds, and other duties as specified in the Connecticut General Statutes.

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Program Explanation:

The Pollution Control Division of the Public Works Department is responsible for the collection, treatment, and discharge of wastewater. Activities include wastewater treatment, sludge disposal, laboratory analysis, sewer line and pump station maintenance. Program authorization is in accordance with Town Ordinances No. 50, No. 95, No. 102, and as amended by Ordinances No. 73, No. 70, No. 67, and No. 63; and as authorized under the Rules and Regulations promulgated by the Water Pollution Control Authority pursuant to authority conferred by Chapter 103 of the General Statutes, Revision of 1958, as amended and supplemented.

Budget Change Commentary: *Wages and benefit costs have been reallocated to Parks and Recreation Department for technical services for the operation and maintenance of the Veteran's Memorial Park Swimming Pool.*

Program Objectives and Goals FY 2017:

- Clean 30 miles of sewer lines
- Implement Grant funded program for the design and construction of Phase IV Sanitary Sewer Improvements I/II Remove and pipe rehabilitation
- Implement the design and construction of Sullivan Avenue Siphon Improvements
- Implement Phase II, Area I, and Phase I Area II Sewer Easement Vegetation Control Plan.

Program Accomplishments FY 2016:

- Significant improvements in wastewater treatment to remove nitrogen will likely result in the Town selling rather than buying nitrogen credits
