1. Proposed Water Pollution Control Budget, proposed Sewer User Charges, Surcharges, Sewer Assessment Schedules, and Septic Disposal Fees for Fiscal Year 2017/2018.

Chairman Richard Aries called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. He stated that the public hearing is being held to present the proposed Water Pollution Control budget (see Exhibit A) and to establish the proposed sewer user charge, surcharges, sewer assessment schedules, and septic disposal fees for fiscal year 2017/2018 (see Exhibit B). Ether Diaz, Recording Secretary read the Legal Notice as it was published in the Journal Inquirer (Exhibit B).

Chairman Aries turned the public hearing over to the new Superintendent of Pollution Control, Mr. Tony Manfre to give a brief summary of the proposed budget (see Exhibit A).

Mr. Tony Manfre explained that the proposed Water Pollution Control Budget (FY 2017/2018) reflects the operation and maintenance of the waste water treatment plant, eleven pump stations, and the maintenance of 130 miles of underground sewer pipe. The Operating & Maintenance (O&M) component of the budget this year is \$3,377,369. The Capital Improvements is another component of the budget and this year is \$1,048,625 which includes manhole rehabilitation program, realigning 3500 linear feet of sewer on Chapel Road and the Vegetation Management plan. Also, the Debt Service component of the budget this year is \$297,713. This budget also represents funding \$87,000 in the Operating Reserve and \$47,000 in the Replacement Reserve. The proposed budget subtotal is \$4,857,707.

Chairman Aries opened the public hearing to the public for comments at 6:38 p.m.

Mr. Robert Dickinson of 19 Birch Road came before members of the Authority and expressed the following: "Many single occupant owners of small attached condominiums

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are paying up to two times in sewer user fees as what is being paid for a multi occupant apartment. The difference of sewer user rates between apartments (many of them being listed as "luxury apartments") and small attached condominiums is not fair to owners of small attached condominiums. Modifications to the present system should be implemented to make these charges more equitable. Unless fees were based on actual water usage, a way of doing this would be to have a base fee (say \$100 or \$150) on all residences including apartments, condominiums and individual homes and then use average water usage as basis for the rest of required revenue for the residential sector."

Chairman Aries thanked Mr. Dickinson for his comments and turned the meeting back to Mr. Tony Manfre to make comments regarding the budget paperwork that was available to the public and handed out. Mr. Manfre explained that he made one minor change in the Operating Reserve. He explained that the copy of the budget that was initially passed around shows \$100,000 in the Operating Reserve; this amount was reduced down to \$87,000. Copies of the updated budgets were available this evening (see Exhibit B).

Ms. Kathy Daugherty of 12 Roy Road came before members of the Authority. She asked if she could obtain what the overall amount difference between the current budget and the proposed budget was. She expressed that the Authority is requesting \$4.8 million and asked what the request was for the 2016-2017 fiscal year.

Chairman Aries responded that the nature of this hearing is such that we take comments in and however, explained that Mr. Manfre is available throughout the day by phone call, by emails, to answer those sorts of questions. Also, this information can be found in the records. He asked Ms. Daugherty to feel free to contact Mr. Manfre at any point and time and he'll be glad to provide that information.

Ms. Daugherty explained that the reason why she asked that question is because she has some documents from November 2016 where the sewer receivables had a balance of \$777,294 that was owed to the Town over the last 10 years. Now, she has new documentation that reflects the amount collected through March 31, 2017 which demonstrates an effort to try to collect back taxes. She explained that even though the Water Pollution Control budget is separate from the Town's general budget, "it is still dipping into residents pocket whether it comes from the state, whether it comes from the federal government or our municipal government". This is additional money that is going to be taken out of the resident's pockets, said Ms. Daugherty. She explained that at this moment, the only information that the Town has is that they will be receiving \$12 million less this year than it did last year from the State; this certainly will put an added burden on the tax payers. Given the efforts since February that have been demonstrated by the staff and collectable agencies, Ms. Daugherty asked if the amount collected, the change from the asked of last year to the asked of this year would be covered in that \$777,000 or what appears to be right now \$528,000.

She also commented that if the Superintendent, Tony Manfre, could have the opportunity to collect more of the owed money to save residents and tax payers a little bit of money in

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this very uncertain time when clearly the Town doesn't know what the State is going to do. "I find that it is a very good deal to have everything flow out of my house and know that it is being taken care of and do appreciate it and I appreciate all of your efforts here on the Water Pollution Control Authority", said Ms. Daugherty. She requested the balance that is owed, and asked if this money could be added to the budget to perhaps mitigate some of the increases.

Chairman Richard Aries thanked Ms. Daugherty for her comments. Chairman Aries commented that those were excellent comments being made by Daugherty. He explained that if anyone looks at the records from the recent past and also into the future they would see that members of the Authority have been very sensitive to the issue of long overdue debts. The authority has in fact taken action to hopefully mitigate that problem and get as much revenue as they possibly can for the very reasons that Ms. Daugherty has described. He thanked Ms. Daugherty once again for her comments.

There were no further questions or comments from the public or members of the Authority, therefore, Chairman Aries declared the Public Hearing closed at 6:47 p.m.

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Program Explanation:

The Pollution Control Division of the Public Works Department is responsible for the collection, treatment, and discharge of wastewater. Activities include wastewater treatment, sludge disposal, laboratory analysis, sewer line and pump station maintenance. Program authorization is in accordance with Town Ordinances No. 50, No. 95, No. 102, and as amended by Ordinances No. 73, No. 70, No. 67, and No. 63; and as authorized under the Rules and Regulations promulgated by the Water Pollution Control Authority pursuant to authority conferred by Chapter 103 of the General Statutes, Revision of 1958, as amended and supplemented.

Budget Change Commentary: *Wages and benefit costs have been reallocated to Parks and Recreation Department for technical services for the operation and maintenance of the Veteran’s Memorial Park Swimming Pool.*

Program Objectives and Goals FY 2018:

- > Clean 30 miles of sewer lines
- > Reline 3500’ of existing sewer pipe on Chapel Road
- > Implement Phase III Area 1; Phase II Area 2 and Phase III Area of the Easement Vegetation Control Plan

Program Accomplishments FY 2017:

- > Significant improvements in wastewater treatment to remove nitrogen will likely result in the Town selling rather than buying nitrogen credits
- > Rehabilitated 3100 linear feet of truss pipe
- > Implemented Phase II Area 1; Phase I Area 2 of the Easement Vegetation Control Plan
- > Completed Electrical Safety Manual

This activity has an annual manpower requirement of 10,000 hours.

Quality Control
The Laboratory Analyst performs chemical and bacteriological analyses of wastewater in measuring treatment performance and operational requirements for compliance with state and federal regulations. The manpower requirement for this function is 2300 hours.

Sludge Dewatering and Disposal
In FY2017, approximately 800 tons of sludge will be processed and transported to the Hartford Metropolitan District for disposal. This activity has a manpower requirement of 1500 hours.

Pump Stations
The Bureau maintains twelve pump stations. This inspection and maintenance activity has an annual manpower requirement of 3500 hours.

Sewer Line Cleaning
The collection system is available to 90% of the Town and extends approximately 140 miles. It services more than 8000 residential units and more than 400 industrial/commercial users. This activity involves the routine monthly cleaning of trouble areas and the removal of blockages. It also includes cleaning and inspection of manholes and approximately 40 miles of line per year. The manpower requirements for these activities are 5600 hours.
